Dear St. Martin's Church Family,

The Episcopal **Advent Wreath** is a circle of greenery, with four candles that represent the four Sundays in Advent.

- Week 1: The Candle of Hope, for the Patriarchs Abraham, The Old Testament ancestors of Jesus The first Sunday of Advent in which we recall the Hope we have in Christ. Purple.
- **Week 2:** The Candle of **Peace**, for the Prophets who foretold the Birth of Jesus. **Purple**.
- Week 3: Candle of Love, for John the Baptist, a son given to Zechariah and Elizabeth in their old age. Purple
- Week 4: The Candle of Joy, for Mary the Mother of Jesus.Pink.
- Christ Candle in the middle on Christmas Day the Birth of Christ. White
