Reflections of Summer

Dear Neighbors,

Returning on the plane from my brief trip to England, I was reviewing photos to share with you when I arrived back in Oregon. Some are of friends at their homes and others were of points of interest I have included in the CLOAK such as York Minster, Lincoln Cathedral and Chapel Allerton Festival with Hymns in the Street. It was a reunion of sorts as I met with many friends I have worked with over the years and listened to their updates of careers and personal lives. I was greeted with much interest in Sowerby by a number of St. Oswald's parishioners who had gathered to meet me at an informal party, and I met with others at an organized coffee hour the next day. What always seems to come out of any trip is how much alike we are rather than the differences. We all want our churches to grow and are learning new ways of being Church to those we serve. These are our neighbors even though they are thousands of miles away from us.

I watched the most recent films on the flight over and went to see *Mama Mia* (here we go again), with a clergy friend who claims we saw the original film together a few years back! I have no reason to doubt her on this. It was fun to see Lincoln and the Cathedral there again too. On the return flight as I reflected on the historical majesty of all that I had seen, I landed upon the documentary of Mr. Fred Rogers in a film called: *Won't you be my neighbor*?

It brought me back to a time in my life when I was beginning to form my own opinions of who my neighbors were. I was in school at the time and the television program continued when my children were in school. It reminded me of the treasures we have here in the United States and the wonderful people who have inspired us over the years to become who we are today. The message Mr. Rogers spread was with children, teaching them that each child is special and that we all are neighbors and should respect each other. I did not know before that he was a Presbyterian minister, but I was not surprised, because he did demonstrate Christian ethos and values. His program tackled all sorts of difficult issues as they came up over the 30 years on the air such as war, death, divorce, racism and the importance of inclusion.

Now at St. Martin's we are in the process of upgrading our Mission Statement language to be more inclusive, and we are registering as a church through the organization Integrity so that St. Martin's will be on the national register as a Believe Outloud Episcopal Congregation. We agreed at our Vestry retreat this year that we would act on what makes us special in Lebanon and that is our inclusiveness. This is something to be proud of and to work on, making sure that all of our neighbors know they are welcome here.















Personal Care Kits Ministry


